# Benefit; of Backyard Streambank Buffer;

- Absorbs pollutants—fertilizer, pesticides, heavy metals, etc.
- ♦ Stores floodwater and sediment
- Provides habitat and food for wildlife
- Regulates water temperatures for aquatic species
- ♦ Stabilizes streambanks—HOLD SOIL IN PLACE

#### Make Your Own Livestakes

Best time to cut and plant livestakes: November-March

- 1. Cut stakes from long, upright branches (2 feet long and thumb-width in diameter). Remove no more than 5% of the parent plant.
- 2. Immediately remove leaves and small branches after cutting stakes to prevent drying out.
- 3. Make a flat cut on the top, and a diagonal cut on the bottom.

## BACKYARD BUFFERS

### Step by Step How To



**Step 1:** Keep livestakes wet in a bucket until ready to plant. Plant your stakes within 24 hours for best results.



**Step 2:** Measure 6 inches from the water surface and angle the livestake perpendicular to the streambank (pointed end goes into the ground).



**Step 3:** Using a mallet or hammer, pound livestakes  $\frac{3}{4}$  of the length into the streambank. Make sure to leave 3-6 inches above ground surface for leaf growth.



**Step 4:** Measure about 2 feet away horizontally (about the length of the livestake) and pound in another livestake.
