

FROM THE PRESIDENT...

What an educational and enjoyable time we had at the 2010 Alabama Master Gardeners Association Conference presented by the Capital City Master Gardeners of Montgomery at the Montgomery Renaissance Hotel and Spa. My compliments to this hard-working group for its professionally executed conference, which had excellent facilities, efficient registration, innovative breakout sessions, delicious meals and excellent speakers.

The conference options were pre-conference workshops or local tours. Two popular workshops were "Home-Grown Garden Critters" and Sister Schubert's "Enjoying the Fruits of Our Labor". I chose touring the Alabama State Capital, which I had not done since I was a child. Alabama has a beautiful capital, rich with history, not just the history of Alabama, but history that affected our entire nation.

Friday morning, Dr Doug Phillips, known to many of you for his APTV program *Discovering Alabama*, was the keynote speaker. Dr Phillips is an Alabama treasure with his educational program and his conservation efforts like the Alabama Forever Wild Program. Friday night, we had our AMGA Annual Awards Banquet; JCMGA's Juanita Smith received a Platinum name badge and Dale O'Connor received a Gold badge.

Saturday morning at the conference, we heard information about the 2011 AMGA Conference "Gardening for Life", presented by the Mobile Master Gardeners. Their idea is to collect MG projects from each association, such as project pictures and county logos, for use in the future. The deadline is August 31, 2010.

We were reminded that the AMGA at the state level has been working on an exciting and worthwhile project: Attendees voted on a distinctive license plate design for the AMGA. The license plate will cost \$50.00 from which the AMGA will receive \$42.17. Fifty percent of the proceeds will go to the AMGA Scholarship Endowment at Auburn, and 50% will fund other Master Gardener needs such as the MG intern scholarships, helpline reference materials and video equipment for the production of educational film clips. Production of the plates will not begin until AMGA members have at least 1,000 plates ordered. We will learn more about this license plate project later. (see photo below)

Jefferson County Master Gardener Association Meeting Minutes for March 9, 2010

The JCMGA February meeting was called to order by President Bruce Steele at 10:06 A.M. in the BBG auditorium. Interns from the current MG class were welcomed. The February minutes and Treasurer's report as printed in *Roots & Shoots* were approved.

Old business: Bruce Steele mentioned that it was still possible to register for next week's AMGA conference in Montgomery. Also, the television in the GPIC area has now been installed.

New business: Dianne Brannon told us about a horticultural therapy program at the Glenwood Center for autistic children and adults. They want to use plants (especially herbs) to stimulate the senses and would like to receive any such plants that we would like to share. Karen Mitchell updated us regarding the Children's Garden at the United Cerebral Palsy Center. She has met with the staff. This will be a year-round project, and she could use some more volunteers.

Nancy Nash requested volunteers sign up to bring refreshments next month. Harold Deason noted that the Turkey Nature Preserve in Pinson still needs birdhouses, particularly bluebird houses.

Bruce reminded us that the annual Spencer Lecture will be held Thursday, March 11th at 6:30 P.M. Also, on Thursday, March 25th, from 5:30 - 7:00 P.M., Fred Spicer will describe the new BBG Master Plan.

We were reminded once again that the BBG Spring Plant Sale will be held on April 15-18, and that many more volunteers are needed. Mary-Bestor Tickle, the BBG volunteer coordinator, was in attendance and indicated that her particular needs at this time are mostly for cashiers and for volunteers for the Thursday night members-only presale. Volunteers will also be needed for Earth Day on April 25th. This year will be the 40th anniversary of Earth Day, which is not a fundraiser, but a free festival to the public. Another volunteer opportunity will be for the Glorious Gardens event, to be held on Mother's Day weekend, May 8 - 9. Volunteers for Glorious Gardens will receive a free ticket. Mary-Bestor Tickle should be contacted if anyone wishes to volunteer for any of these events. Mary-Bestor also read a thank-you note from one of the children who had visited the gardens with her class.

Want to Help Make a Three-Sisters Garden?

If you want to help make a three-sisters garden at Aldridge Botanical Gardens, call Vasha Rosenblum at 910-3211, or e-mail her at vashan1@bellsouth.net for information.

In case you aren't sure, the three sisters are corn, beans and squash. The corn and pole beans are planted on top of large mounds that are about 3

feet apart. The squash are planted in between and cover the ground to keep it cool, conserve moisture and keep weeds down. This is a Native American agricultural method with many myths and a few facts that explain how it works. We are putting one in at Aldridge for demonstration purposes and to enhance a Native American focus next fall.
