AMGA AWARDS PROGRAM

Dottye Pierce, MG of North Alabama AMGA Awards Committee Chair

The winner of the 2010 Top Hours for the Year Award is Dee Hubbert of the Shoals, with a total of 1837 hours for 2009. The 2010 Jean Lee Lifetime Hours Award recipient is Kathie Bass of the Master Gardeners of North Alabama, who has volunteered 8419 hours since completing the class. The 2010 Gary Murray Outstanding Service and Dedication Award went to Alice Lawler of the Master Gardeners of North Alabama. She took the MG class after being presented with a "scholarship" upon her retirement from teaching. Since completing the class in 1998 she has been a very active member, working on nearly every project. She began assisting with MG classes in 1999 and has served as Class Coordinator for the last eight years. In addition to her administrative duties, she and another Master Gardener teach the Container Gardening class each session of the class. She worked closely with the REA to develop and organize the Tri County (Madison, Morgan and Limestone) classes beginning in 2005. On the AMGA State Steering Committee, she chairs the Class Management Committee, which deals with planning for MG classes statewide. In addition, she has been involved with assisting with both children's and adult classes at Huntsville Botanical Garden and teaching Container Gardening for UA Huntsville continuing education program. She resides in the Old Town Historic District of Huntsville and has opened her garden for tours several times. Her other community involvement is extensive and keeps her active outside of Master Gardener activities.

The 2010 Mary Lou McNabb Alabama Master Gardener of the Year Award recipient is Kathie Bass, nominated by Limestone County. She took the MG class in 2002 and immediately became involved in a variety of local association projects, including working closely with classes and assisting interns in finding ways of earning required hours. In 2005 she revitalized the position of Volunteer Coordinator and developed a job description and procedures as well as guidelines for all project chairs. She has also served as chair of several local committees and currently serves AMGA as State Conference Fundraising Chair, a position she accepted in 2009. She works diligently to enlist the sponsorships necessary for a quality and affordable conference. She holds memberships in three local associations and is actively involved with two of them. At the local level she has established a strong relationship with Habitat of Humanity and coordinates a number of landscaping projects at Habitat homes in Huntsville every year. She has organized and conducted homeowner education workshops as well as the Landscape Design Workshop for Master Gardener classes since 2005. When asked about her involvement with the MG program, she states, "the multitude of opportunities offered throughout the Master Gardener program have enriched my life and hopefully made me a better person."

- We have two new board members – Karin Carmichael, from Montgomery and Sam Andrews from Fairhope.
- Kerry Smith reported that 2,026 master gardeners reported hours for 2009, which was a significant increase. There were 430 interns from 29 counties in 2009.

- The Local Association Handbook revision should be ready for review, by the Board, at the June meeting.
- Bob Crabtree reported that only \$2,000 of the \$5,000 was given out for project funding. Local associations are encouraged to apply for these funds to be awarded at the 2011 conference. Look for deadline dates for applying later this year in Pathways.
- A license tag design was accepted at conference. Kathie Bass will start the paper work. Once this is done she will let everyone know through Pathways. Then 1,000 plates will need to be pre-ordered before the state will begin making the plates for distribution. Any garden enthusiast can purchase the plate. The board approved that the funds generated from plate sales will be distributed as follows: fifty percent to the AMGA Horticulture Scholarship Fund Endowment and fifty percent to the Alabama Master Gardener Program.

Autauga County

The beginning months of each year are always filled with MG awards, plant sale preparations, and plans for what we want to accomplish in our demonstration gardens and our own gardens as we head into spring.

Fifteen members received pins and lots of appreciation from ACES for working the 2009 Helpline. Twelve members received "Reach for the Stars" pins and certificates, and Gene Stapleton's gold badge was awarded at the conference. Congratulations, Gene!

Our monthly programs began with city horticulturalist Ken Johnson sharing his accomplishments and vision for adding more color to Prattville.

Ronald Ellis gave a dynamic presentation on organic gardening at the March meeting. He covered French Intensive double dug raised beds, companion plants, and organic sprays for pests.

We have 23 enthusiastic interns in this year's class and a new mentor program to help them feel already connected to their local organization. They are eager to find volunteer opportunities for sharing information and serving the community. Interns represented Master Gardeners and distributed Extension information at Autauga County Military Community Resource Day. We are proud of this new group and look forward to working with them in the years ahead.

Baldwin County

We kicked off the year with the start of our new intern class in January and the re-opening of the Master Gardener Infoline February 1. At the end of February, our master gardeners participated in Arbor Day tree giveaways in Fairhope, Daphne, Foley, Gulf Shores, Silverhill and Magnolia Springs. We also distributed tree planting and maintenance guides prepared by our county extension.

March saw the implementation of our public education series "Tuesdays with Master Gardeners". We presented two-hour workshops on each of five Tuesday evenings in March covering such topics as repairing lawn and garden beds, pest management and fertilizers, raised beds and kitchen gardens, container gardening, and landscape design. Attendance increased more than six-fold from our fledging effort last year.

In March we also participated in the annual Festival of Flowers in Mobile, where master gardeners have always had a popular booth. This year's featured potted plants in a garden setting, and our volunteers gave sage advice and information to all who stopped by.

Our twelfth annual spring plant sale was April 8-11. This is last big plant sale of the season and our major fundraiser for the year. Offerings included over 50 varieties of perennials propagated from master gardeners own gardens and native trees and shrubs from area nurseries. Thirteen area garden clubs were invited to attend a special opening day event including a presentation on native plants by Tom Dodd III, a well known third generation nurseryman.

The end of April brings Earth Day Mobile Bay at Fairhope's Pier Park. Featuring entertainment, food and extensive exhibits, this huge celebration of things green is one that the whole family can enjoy. Baldwin County master gardeners will have a prominent booth at the fair, as they do every year.

The end of April also will see the graduation of our class of 21 interns. Although this class is somewhat smaller than in recent years, we continue to recruit exceptional "new blood" for our organization. Our Mentor Program matches interns with experienced master gardeners for support and to help integrate them into our organization.

Calhoun County
