This summer Susie and I decided to see Alabama a little at a time on day trips. We have wanted to see more of our state and have found day trips the perfect vehicle. We first drove north to Cullman to visit Southern Accents, a large emporium of all things great and small related to the home, especially older homes that use a lot of brass. Then for lunch we went to the All Steak Restaurant, where we had prime rib

au jus, vegetables and a chocolate dessert – so much to eat, so little time.

On our next trip we went to Eutaw to the beautiful 1860 Greek Revival Kirkwood Mansion. Then we went to Demopolis to see Gaineswood, one of the best examples of a Greek Revival structure in America, and whose dining room was once called the most beautiful room in all of Alabama. In Greensboro, we visited Magnolia Grove, a smaller, less elegant, more livable, "city" home of a plantation owner whose wife didn't want to live in the country. It was in Greensboro that we met our Waterloo, the Pie Factory. I ordered a peach pie to go. The pie was enormous, and the young man helping me didn't know what he was doing, so I helped him put the pie in two aluminum pie pans. It tasted wonderful.

Next, we drove though the beautiful Bankhead Forest, where we saw many different large leafed oaks, to our next city, Florence. First, though, we went to the site of LaGrange Academy, a college for young men built right before the beginning of the Civil War. (The original college and the surrounding small town were unfortunately burned to the ground by Federal troops during the war.) Our tour was greatly enhanced by a gentleman whose LaGrange Academy Society is protecting and refurbishing the grounds with help from the state legislature. Afterwards we had lunch at Momma Jean's, where the plates of food were so enormous that I could not eat all my vegetables; anyway, there was chocolate pie to be eaten!

After visiting so many historical antebellum sites, we then toured the only Frank Lloyd Wright home in the state, the Rosenbaum House. This amazing structure is such a clever use of space. The original furniture that Frank Lloyd Wright designed for the home is still there, and the owner, who had lived there since 1938, left much of her own furniture, making the home feel even more authentic. Though the owner loved her home, it was cold and leaky, a typical problem with Frank Lloyd Wright houses because for Wright function followed form.

Well, September is here and the temperature has moderated. As the heat ran all of us out of the garden, I hope you found other fun and interesting things to do that were as entertaining as our day trips. Speaking of trips, I hope to see all of you at the beautiful garden of Hayes Jackson in Anniston.

September Gardening Calendar

Fruits and Nuts: New catalogs will be arriving soon. Start plans for future selection and plantings. Take a soil test for new planting areas. Fertilize established strawberry plantings.

Shrubs: Study landscape to determine plant needs. Check early varieties of camellias. You may want to replace those damaged in spring by late freezes. After fall growth is completed, spray all shrubs with a fungicide.

Lawns: Plant seed of winter grasses where situation prevents planting permanent grasses. Winter seeds will appear soon. Stop fertilization three weeks before frost.

Roses: Protect fall crops of blossoms from aphids and thrips. Keep plants healthy.

Annuals and Perennials: Last chance for planting perennials and biennials. Old clumps of perennials may be divided. Plant peonies.

Bulbs: Spring-flowering bulbs may be planted late this month in North Alabama. Delay planting in South Alabama.

Miscellaneous: Clean up infestations of insects on azaleas, camellias, boxwoods, gardenias, hollies, etc. If oil spray is needed, don't use in freezing weather. Build compost bin or box; leaves will be falling soon. Move houseplants indoors.

Vegetable Seed: Plant hardy vegetables and root crops.

Vegetable Plants: Plant cabbage, collards, cauliflower, celery, Brussels sprouts, and onion sets.
