Reserve Your Alabama Master Gardener Car Tag



If you pay attention to the cars that pass you on the highway or to the cars parked near yours in a parking lot, you will see many sport some type of vanity tag. You will see tags for various universities and different causes. There is even a tag for square dancers.

Now the gardeners of Alabama have a tag designed with them in mind. Kerry Smith, the state coordinator for the Alabama Cooperative Extension System's Master Gardener program, says people can pre-order a new Alabama Master Gardeners tag.

"Master Gardeners as well as people who want to support Master Gardener programs can complete a commitment form available now at Alabama county probate offices or wherever people buy their car tags," says Smith.

The specialty tag costs \$50 more than your current tag taxes and fees. That money will be divided between the Alabama Master Gardener program and the Alabama Master Gardener Association Horticulture scholarship at Auburn University.

"If you are interested in one, order your tag now even if it is several months before your current tag expires," says Smith. She explains that the Master Gardener tag must receive 1,000 commitments to purchase in the current year. If the tag doesn't get enough supporters, it won't be created.

Jefferson County Master Gardener Association March 8, 2011

The JCMGA March meeting was called to order by President Glenda Dicks at 10:00 a.m. First-time attendees were introduced. The minutes of the February meeting and the Treasurer's report were approved as printed in the February edition of *Roots and Shoots*.

Mary-Bestor Grant, the Volunteer Coordinator for Friends of BBG, presented her Top 10 Reasons to Volunteer for the Spring Plant Sale. Glenda Dicks notified the membership of two corrections to the Reach for the Stars awards: Ann McAdams and Madelon Rushing received the bronze and gold star awards, respectively.

Tony Glover noted that in reporting hours using the new system we must assign all hours to a category for them to be counted. He then reviewed the use of the web site to report hours. Glenda Dicks emphasized that Master Gardeners can no longer call at the end of the year to turn in their hours for the entire year. Hours will NOT be counted if reported in this manner. Glenda also stated again that she would like anyone with questions regarding any MG activities to submit them in written form in the box provided at the front of the auditorium for that purpose.

Several MGs reported on ongoing projects. Dianne Brannon, coordinator of the Glenwood Autism Center project, provided a list of perennials she would like to have and indicated that these plants could be brought to her at the April meeting. Karen Mitchell reported on the status of the Hand in Hand Children's Garden at the United Cerebral Palsy Center and mentioned that there would be a workday the next Saturday (March 12). Jennifer Phillips reported on the Snow Rogers Elementary School projects in Gardendale, including a Jr. MG project.

Wanda Kiel, who is the new JeffCoMG webmaster, discussed revisions of the web site and demonstrated changes she has made to date. She still has room on the site and is looking for additional material. Fletcher Harvey reported that those MGs who are interested in training to become docents at Aldridge Gardens should contact Laverne Martin at Aldridge. The meeting was then turned over to Tony Glover who presented a program on Debunking Gardening Myths.

At the end of Tony's presentation, he was presented a sawtooth oak seedling with a promise of a Toomer's Oak seedling to come later, along with a Lowe's gift card. These gifts were presented to recognize and honor his service to the Jefferson County Master Gardeners.
